Year 13—PROM PAYMENT

The Year 13 Prom takes place on Thursday 2nd May 2024 and the deadline for payment has now passed! There are a number of outstanding payments which need to be paid **as soon as possible**.

As the instalment date has expired, the SQuid system will not allow you to make any payments until the expired instalment has been paid. In order for you to do this, SQuid automatically greys out the payment, in effect selecting it for payment. If you click on the check-out button, the selected payments will appear and allow you to make the payment. Please note, you should make the payment on a **desktop computer** as the mobile app will not let you pay for expired instalments - Thank You

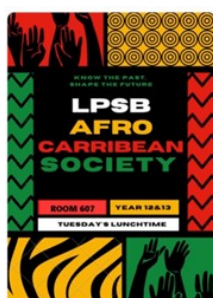

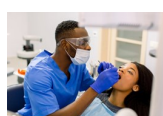

We really appreciate your support in helping give our students access to a wide range of opportunities, to enable students develop their employability skills and understanding of the world of work.

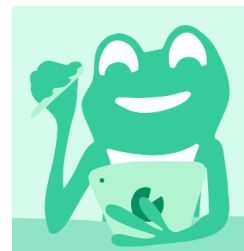

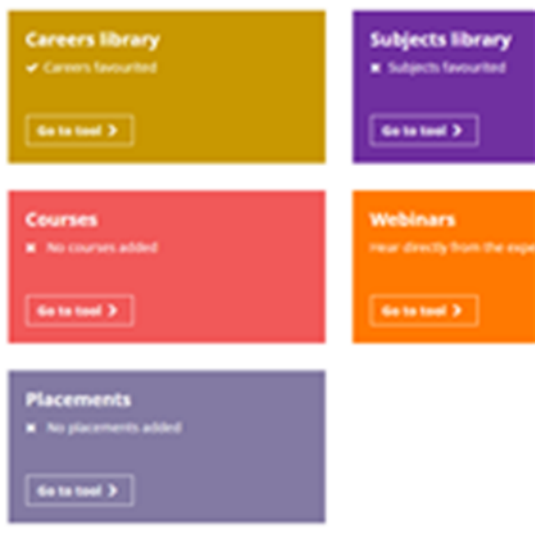

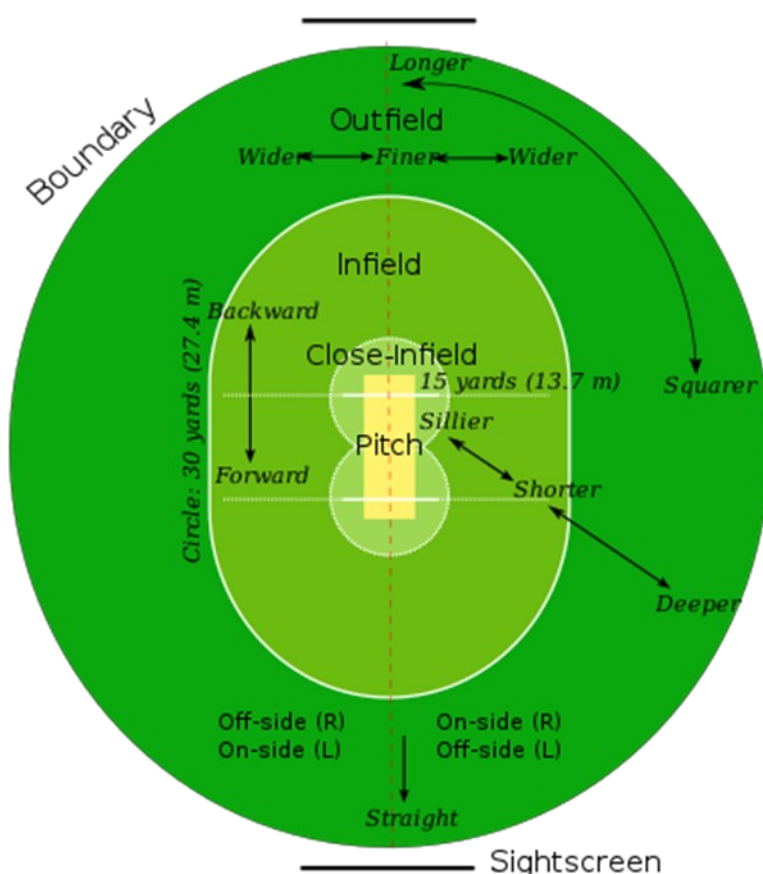

Go to https://www.better.org.uk/library/users/sign_up to start the application process.

Once a member you will have full access to the extensive library catalogue, be able to use online resources such as digital newspapers, online reference and research resources and borrow a range of DVDs. In addition, members have access to free Wi-Fi in all 16 Bromley libraries and there are computing and printing facilities at most locations. There is also an app where you can manage your loans, reserve resources, download and read eBooks, access digital magazines and more.




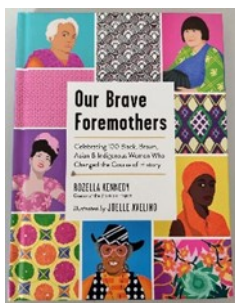
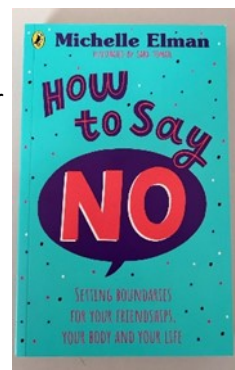
A word from the Library...

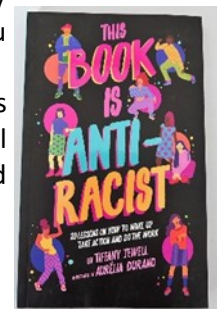

Featuring women of color changemakers, risk-takers, and visionaries, artists, scientists, activists, and more, Our Brave Foremothers is a rich collection of short biographies detailing the women's accomplishments, hardships, passions, and joys. Included alongside the stories are inspirational quotes from the women, beautifully detailed artwork by illustrator Joelle Avelino, and actionable prompts that encourage readers to impact the world around them in positive ways as a tribute to the foremothers in the book and their own.

Gain a deeper understanding of your anti-racist self as you progress through 20 chapters that spark introspection, reveal the origins of racism that we are still experiencing and give you the courage and power to undo it. Each lesson builds on the previous one as you learn more about yourself and racial oppression. An activity at the end of every chapter gets you thinking and helps you grow with the knowledge. All you need is a pen and paper.

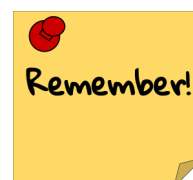
