SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS STUDYING STEM SUBJECTS



All students who purchased Up Learn by 14th May should have received an email from Up Learn to their school email address with details about how to set up their account.

Elliott Warner 13B

Elliott had the pleasure of interviewing Victora Brignell earlier this month. Victoria is a radio producer with the BBC and a disability champion. Elliott took on the role as interviewer with ease and had a wonderful conversation with Victoria about how she coped with living away from home for the first time as a student, her professional working life at the BBC, where she has worked as both a researcher and producer. Victoria is currently a producer for the Radio 4 programme 'In Our Time' presented by Melvyn Bragg. They also spoke about her travels and voluntary roles with numerous disability groups across London.

Victoria has been tetraplegic since childhood and is paralysed from the neck downwards. She was incredibly inspiring and had some great advice for Elliott who is about to embark on his life and next steps after finishing his A levels. Elliott has his own set of challenges being a young person with cerebral palsy and what others would take for granted as part of their daily routine and life, can be more testing for Elliott. Elliott's perseverance is very much engrained into his personality which has made him an incredibly resilient person with a talent and flair for writing, something he hopes to pursue into higher education and beyond.

Victoria's main piece of advice for Elliott was 'Go for it!' If you want to do something then go for it – don't let anything stop you.



Congratulations to **Pratik Dhar 12K** who has been chosen to receive the Jack Petchey Award.

Pratik is an amazing ambassador and autism champion at LPSB. Pratik has shown such maturity and personal growth in understanding his own journey as an autistic person and from this he wanted to share his insight in living with ASD and how it has positively shaped him into the young man he is today.

Pratik wanted to share his experience to not only educate but also to reach out to others who may struggle with their own ASD diagnosis by saying that it's OK's to be different and ASD can be a positive force in your life. Pratik made a short video presenting his understanding and experiences of living with ASD, which was included in the whole school Autism Awareness assembly.



Pratik gives up some of his free time at school to mentor younger students in Maths, a subject he excels in and is passionate about, this peer mentoring is invaluable for the younger student. Alongside this, at weekends, Pratik volunteers at Bromley Cricket Club coaching younger people in cricket skills.

Pratik has decided to use some of the money he's been awarded to buy cricket bats for the school team and provide some Maths and social interaction resources for the Learning Support Department.

Thank you Pratik and a well done on this award and achievement.

tion journey!



Olivia: Level 4 Business Analyst, Civil Service

The role:

Technology, change and project analysis.
 18 months duration.

Why did you apply?

I studied Business at GCSE and A level and so wanted to carry this onto my career.

The application process: An online application, followed by an in-person assessment centre, and then a final in-person interview. The whole took process took just under two months.

Top tips:

- 1. Push yourself outside of your comfort zone (I had to do things in my assessment centre that I normally wouldn't do but if I hadn't done it, I may not have got the apprenticeship)
- 2. Have things to make yourself standout such as extracurriculars there are so many people that apply to the apprenticeships, so you need things to make them remember you and make you different from other applicants
- 3. Don't get your hopes up- unfortunately you can make it so close to the end for some apprenticeships (down to the final few applicants) and then not get it. Have other options and don't give up with your applications.

Make sure to start early- the process can be very long and time consuming you don't want to be worrying about it during exams.

Josh: Level 3 Fidelity Investments Resolutions

The role:

- Managing clients Investments portfolios
- Dealing with any problems they may have

Two Year duration

Why did you apply?

- I have always been interested in investments
- Fidelty is a large and successful investment company

The application process: it took about three months

Top tips:

- 1. Some companies didn't even reply, so don't be disheartened or get your hopes up too much if you get through the first stages, be resilient and move onto the next application!
- 2. Do extra things to make you stand out from the crowd- research the company and industry, which gives you something to talk about in the interviews and makes you seem keen and interested, which is what they're looking for
- 3. I completed research on their investment portfolio and read books on investment
- 4. Make every application good quality, don't rush them or stress as it's not as bad as it seems!
- 5. Get it done earlier than you think as the applications take a while. You don't want to be trying to complete video assessments whilst revising for exams
- 6. Take all the advice and help you can get!

2023 Geography Student Wins Prestigious Royal Geographical Society (RGS) Award

The Geography Department are delighted to announce that Ella Herbert, one of our finest Year 13 Geographers from our 2023 cohort, has been awarded the Ron Cooke Award for the best piece of Non-Examination Assessment (NEA) for last year by the Royal Geographical Society (RGS). The RGS are one of the most prestigious geographical organisations in the world and known as the leading society and professional body for geographers in the UK. Each year they honour academics, researchers, adventurers, and students of geography from around the country.

Ella's independent investigation was awarded full marks and was an incredibly presented and insightful research project. Her research question 'To what extent are the key players impacting the development of Cambers sand dunes' included an incredible combination of in depth theory, unbelievable data presentation and sharp, astute and highly academic geographical analysis.

Speaking about receiving the award Ella said:

"It's a great honour to accept this prestigious award. I dedicated a lot of hard work and effort into my inves-

tigation and feel like I know Camber Sands like the back of my hand. Although at the time, I felt like I'd had enough of researching into sand dunes, it is nice now to step back and look proudly on my work, but also to see how I have produced some clear evidence of humans impacting the physical environment. Thanks to my teachers and family for4 all their support with this piece of work".



The students from LPSB, LPSG and Ravenswood are all prospective medical students looking to apply for Medicine courses. They attended a session about studying medicine at Cambridge, had a tour of the college campus with a lovely lunch in the Selwyn College halls, but the highlight of the day for them was performing a virtual dissection and surgery on the interactive Anotomage table which is used by medical students. Selwyn College is the only medical teaching facility in the country to possess one of these. It was an inspiring day, and we hope to run this trip again in the summer of 2025.

Our current year 12 cohort featured here are currently preparing for the UCAT exam this summer, ready for their UCAS applications in October.


A Sixth Form-led Men's Mental Health Society:





LPSB Sixth Form girls made school history on Wednesday, as the newly formed Girls' Cricket team played their first ever game. From the twenty-one current squad players that have joined since the start of term, sixteen of them played a 10 over game at Hub 4.

Report as follows from 1XI Girls coach Mr Kempster:

"On a typical English cloudy day, Langley Vipers, captained by Caitlin Connolly won the toss and elected for Langley Cobras to bat first where Abigal Coates and Emily Larkham opened the batting.

From the first ball, the Cobra's intentions were to be aggressive and run everything. Going well until midway through the second over, Abby mistimed a pull shot and was caught at Mid wicket by Rebecca Goddard. Giving Sebrycca Baker her first Langley wicket. Two balls later, Sebryka stuck again. This time, claiming the wicket of Cobra's captain Tallulah Ndi-kanwu with a fine catch by Caitlin at Mid on.

With Langley Cobras on a score of 10 for two wickets, in came Ella Forde. Between herself and Emily, they recorded the second highest partnership of the day with 31 runs. 
