Message from Miss Parr, Head of Year 13

Hopefully you are now back into the swing of things. You should be receiving feedback from your subject teachers about your TES exams over the next few weeks, leading into Parents Evening. Please make sure you act and respond to this feedback to improve your mastery and develop your exam skills in these subjects. See each bit of feedback as an opportunity to improve. Make good use of your study time, come up with a plan to help you track your progress. Make sure to ask your subject teachers for support and guidance.

Ask yourselves "what will you do differently next time?".

Continue to work towards your UCAS and apprenticeship applications. Remember our internal deadline of Friday 20th December. Seek advise from your subject teachers. Make an appointment with Mr Savill or the UCAS advisor. If you are struggling, just make a start. It doesn't need to be perfect just yet.

I know that this can all feel hugely overwhelming, but keep going! Make a plan and make a start.

Message from Mr Cook, Head of Year 12

This half-term is already proving a busy one for Year 12. This week alone saw dozens of our students representing the school sports teams, with Girls' Netball, Hockey and Rugby sides all in action, as well as the Boys' Rugby, Hockey and Football teams. Students from Year 12 played an important role in our Remembrance commemoration events and Autumn Concert, and rehearsals for the school musical Chicago are in full swing and sounding fantastic already. As the head of year, it's such a pleasure to see so many of our Year 12s really throwing themselves into everything that the school offers.

As a new sixth-former it can be very easy to get swept up in all that is going on, but a key skill of A-level and BTEC study is that of time-management and juggling multiple competing demands. GCSE study does not place the same requirements on students, who have every minute of their day carefully mapped out, and so this can be a real learning-curve for new Year 12s as they adjust to the responsibility of managing their own time. As such, my two key tips are these:

- Plan your study periods. Spend the first study period of your week organising your diary and specifically setting out which tasks you'll complete and when, so that you can ensure you hit required deadlines and don't leave everything to the last minute. It also means that you can maximise your working time during that study period – make an hour's work really an hour.
- 2. See your school day as a full-time job. Adults organise their other commitments outside their working hours try as far as you can to do the same. 0830-1600 on weekdays should be reserved for schoolwork. Do this consistently and you'll find that you don't have last-minute panics and all-nighters as you furiously try to finish that essay you've been putting off for a week.

We understand that these are skills that are learned and are not intrinsic to students, and that they haven't really needed to be developed before in your school career. If you find yourself struggling with organisation, please see your tutor, teachers or Mrs Hasan or me for some help and guidance.



Sixth Form Reminders

Lanyards and ID Cards

- These are required for every student in the Sixth Form
- You are required to have <u>both the lanyard and the ID card</u>
- These should be visible at all times while you are on site
- This includes after school
- These must be worn round the neck
- This is an essential part of our safeguarding policy
- Failure to have your lanyard means you will be sent home
- If you subsequently miss lessons, then you will be expected to catch up this time

Failure to return to school will be treated as truancy and result in further sanctions

Lost Lanyards and ID Cards

- You need to report to Ms Cross in room 101
- Ms Cross will contact home and issue you a temporary lanyard in exchange for a deposit
- Your deposit will be returned once you have returned your lanyard
- You will need a replacement lanyard for each day until your new card has arrived
- New lanyards and ID cards can be purchased on sQuid
- New Card £2
- New Lanyard and Card Holder £3
- New Lanyards and ID cards will be collected from Ms Cross in room 101
- If you lose your temporary lanyard you will need to pay for an additional replacement and be issued an ACU

- Students must register punctually at 8.20am every morning and at 1.05pm every afternoon.
- If you arrive late, you **must** sign in at the late desk in the Sixth Form Study Centre. Failure to do so will result in you receiving an unauthorised absence mark.

Year 13 A Level Revision Session

Royal Geographical Society, Kensington, London

This is a reminder that Year 13 Geography students have been offered the opportunity to attend and participate in an <u>A-Level revision session</u> run by The Royal Geographical Society in their headquarters in Kensington.

The A Level study day will consist of a series of three 40 minute subject knowledge focused lectures – hazards and tectonics, changing places and global governance / global systems (topics are subject to change). Students will have the opportunity to ask questions after each lecture. The event will end with a short session looking at exam technique and how to succeed in A Level examinations.

The date of this event is **Wednesday 27th November 2024.** Students should make their own way to and from the venue for 9:30am. The session finishes at about 1:00pm. The address is: Royal Geographical Society (with IBG), 1 Kensington Gore, London, SW7 2AR. The nearest tube is South Kensington (Circle and District Line - from Victoria) or the 52 bus from London Victoria stops along Kensington Gore. The cost of this trip will be £10.30. No refreshments are being provided.

If Parents/Carers would like their child included in this trip then please return the parental consent form that you will have received and pay (via sQuid) £10.30 by Monday 25th November. This contribution is voluntary, however, if insufficient contributions are received, the trip may not be able to proceed. In this eventuality, any payment received will be refunded.

Economics Student Conference 2024

The 2024 online Student Economics Conference was a remarkable event that allowed 60 bright and enthusiastic Economics students to explore the world of economics. The conference offered a dynamic platform for these young minds to delve into key economic theories, gain insights from experts, and engage in thought-provoking discussions. Over the course of the event, students were able to gain valuable knowledge that will shape their academic and professional futures.

In conclusion, the Student Economics Conference 2024 proved to be an inspiring and enriching experience for all involved. The students demonstrated enthusiasm, curiosity, and a keen interest in expanding their understanding of economics.

This week's book recommendations are novellas. Nothing too long, but something concise to read in your spare time.

Small Things Like These, by Claire Keegan

This book has just been made into a film staring Cillian Murphy and Emily Watson.

In 1985 Ireland, devoted father Bill Furlong discovers disturbing secrets kept by the local convent and uncovers shocking truths of his own.





Animal Farm, by George Orwell

When the downtrodden animals of Manor Farm overthrow their master Mr Jones and take over the farm themselves, they imagine it is the beginning of a life of freedom and equality. But gradually a cunning, ruthless elite among them, masterminded by the pigs Napoleon and Snowball, starts to take control. Orwell wrote the novel at the end of 1943, but it almost remained unpublished; its savage attack on Stalin, at that time Britain's ally, led to the book being refused by publisher after publisher. Orwell's simple, tragic fable has since become a world-famous classic

The End We Start From, by Megan Hunter

In the midst of a mysterious environmental crisis, as London is submerged below flood waters, a woman gives birth to her first child, Z. Days later, the family are forced to leave their home in search of safety. As they move from place to place, shelter to shelter, their journey traces both fear and wonder as Z's small fists grasp at the things he sees, as he grows and stretches, thriving and content against all the odds.

Small Worlds, by Caleb Azumah Nelson

Small Worlds, the follow-up to Nelson's multi-award-winning debut Open Water, focuses on Stephen, a teenage second-generation migrant of Ghanaian parents, Eric and Joy. Theirs is an involved and loving family. Stephen's closeness to his mother is especially apparent in their tender biweekly visits to the Peckhamplex cinema. At Church with his family, the shimmer of Black hands raised in praise. With his band, making music speaking not just to their hardships, but their joys. Grooving with his best friend, so close their heads might touch. Dancing alone to his father's records, uncovering parts of a man he has never truly known. His youth, shame and sacrifice. Stephen has only ever known himself in song. But what becomes of him when the music fades?





The Art of War by Sun-Tzu

Sun Tzu was a Chinese military general, strategist, philosopher, and writer who lived during the Eastern Zhou period. This best-selling book offers ancient wisdom on how to use skill, cunning, tactics and discipline to outwit your opponent. For more than two thousand years, Sun-Tzu's The Art of War has provided leaders with profound insights into the use of skill, tactics, psychology and discipline to outwit opponents. Said to have inspired Napoleon, and used by Mao Zedong and General Douglas MacArthur, as well as many famous business gurus, politicians and sports stars, its ancient words of wisdom provide a touchstone for today's managers and executives fighting their boardroom battles.
